BUSINESS METHODS and ETHICS?


Tim Hast, RTT, presented our technical last month on business practices. He shared a number of ways he has discovered to improve his efficiency, including such things as buying in bulk, mapping out jobs and shopping trips, and keeping careful records of time and materials for each job.

A most interesting discussion followed his presentation. We talked about pricing of jobs, competition, short-cuts, and quality of work. As an example from our discussion, consider the following. You replace a set of plastic elbows in your shop in about four hours and charge perhaps \$100. If you learn how to do a comparable job in the customer's home in half the time, should you reduce your rate? Or let's

say that you have spent 8 hours cutting and fitting pinhlocks. With experience and better tools you cut two hours off that time. Should you charge less? If there is someone advertising piano tunings for \$25 in the newspaper, should that influence your own tuning price? And how much of your time does a customer deserve for a \$45 tuning fee?

Part of what I appreciate most about our profession is that it is not regulated. We set our standards and our prices individually. A lot of judgement is involved, and obviously the customer is vulnerable to abuse of his or her trust. I am affirmed each time my advice or work is requested or whenever someone is pleased with what I've done. It is really quite personal, and I like that. Perhaps this is why this discussion was so interesting to me. Sharing on a more personal level left me feeling good about having gone out on that cold wet Saturday and participating in our group.
