PTG-L (Internet) STUFF "PIANO 300 concern"

This may be considered a small potato item by some, but hopefully not.

Today I was reminded that Bartolomeo Cristofori's name is still being spelled incorrectly by some PTG members with a "h" between the "C and r". It is even spelled with the "h" in at least one piano book. Would it not be in our best. interest to uniformly agree to have members of the Piano Technicians Gulid make every effort to use one consistent spelling of the earliest recognized inventor of the plano from now on?

Cristofori is credited with three principles still in use today*:

- 1) He substituted hammers for harpsichord jacks which made it possible to create soft and foud sounds directly by finger pressure.
- 2) He developed an escapement device to permit the hammer to drop back immediately after delivering its string a blow, leaving the string to vibrate freely as long as the key is held.

 3) He also invented the shifting soft pedal arrangement, called the una corda.

Also, according to this same publication, John Broadwood of England invented the sustaining pedal sometime after 1770. (page 8)

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Highlights from the Tulsa Seminar

"Understanding Cash-Flow" U.S. Small Business Administration Pamphlet

Failure to properly plan cash flow is one of the leading causes for small business failures...A sufficient cash flow covers your business by meeting obligations (i.e., paying bilts), serving as a cushion in case of emergencies, and providing investment capital...

Cash-flow analysis should show whether your daily operations generate enough cash to meet your obligations, and how major outflows of cash to pay your obligations relate to major inflows of cash... As a result, you can tell if inflows and outflows from your operation combine to result in a positive cash flow or in a net drain...

You should always keep enough cash on hand to cover expenses and as an added cushion for security. However, it is unwise to keep more money on hand than is necessary. Excess cash should be invested in an accessible, interest-bearing, low-risk account, such as a savings account, short-term certificate of deposit or Treasury bill. Keeping excess cash on hand limits both your growth and the return on your investment...

With a personal computer, your business can have the added advantage of quick cash-flow projections as well as many other useful financial-planning tools. A good financial-management package and computer will enable you to review projected inflows and outflows of cash from month to month or year to year...
