Meeting In Review

Last month's meeting was held at Norman Cantrell's new shop. The attendance was rather bleak with only four in attendance including one guest. As such no business of any sort or significance was conducted but the Treasurer reported a bank balance of \$1419.45. Norman did give a report on the State of the Chapter as of the beginning of 1999. The report focused on membership and it was reported that we had four fewer members from the same time last year. Two had dropped their membership and two others had transferred to other chapters.

A technical presentation on the replacement of damper rod lift hooks was presented by Norman. The method involved fabricating the hooks from rod stock and securing the hooks into the damper rod using JB Weld to hold it in place. This is a shop repair and requires the JB Weld to set up over night before returning the damper rod to the plano.

TOOL OF THE MONTH

During the show and tell portion of the last meeting a couple of clamps were shown. These were a small version of the Quick Grip Har clamps which are available at hardware stores and home centers. These are six inches in length and have the neoprene clamp pads. They cost about \$9.00 each and can be purchased at Wal Mart. These clamps small size makes them great to fit inside the tool box and can be used for a variety of clamping jobs like keytops and broken keys, etc. One unique feature of these smallest clamps is that the fixed end is removable and can be switched to the opposite end of the bar and the result is a small spreader in addition to a clamp. In a pinch it was demonstrated that these clamps in the spreader mode could be used to remove hammer heads from upright shanks. This was most likely to be performed when the heads are already loose and rattling and needing to be reglued.


BOB BARNHOFF


Update from Jack Wyatt, RVP

OAKIE DOAKIE PIANO SUPPLY

Have you ever noticed that some of the supply houses offer keybed felt that is made from 20 percent reprocessed wool. Have you ever wondered just where the wool comes from that they use to re-process. In actuality it comes from the center holes punched in all those balance and front rail punchings. You know those small felt pieces that are the equivalent of doughnut holes. There is also a lot of waste created by punching round punchings to start with. If all the punchings were made square there would be less left over felt and the percentage of felt available to reprocess would be a lot less. In other words if you had square balance rail and front rail punchings they would be made from purer and newer felt.

We are proud to offer the first square balance rail and front rail punchings in the industry. In addition to being made from newer and purer felt they provide a more even contact surface for the keys. I'm sure many of you have stayed awake at night wondering just what happens to the edges of the wood on the keys that isn't allowed to come into contact with the balance rail felt. With these new punchings you can now sleep better at night. Of course newer and purer felt is slightly more expensive than reprocessed but for that next keybed job you are doing just remember that you now have a choice. Just use our regular catalogue numbers for keybed punchings just add the letter "S" to indicate you want square punchings, we will bill you for the difference in price.
