When doing tunings on vertical pianos, make a quick check to insure the bass hammers aren't clipping their neighbors. Reason: when the sustain pedal is in use, your excellent tuning will not sound so nice.

To fix, either space the hammers correctly, or for a quick fix, use a sandpaper file to remove the edge of the hammer face striking the neighbor. The quick fix only takes a few moments and can save you some embarrassment.
