President's Message

This past Monday I did a job that reminded me what a privilege it is to work on fine pianos. I tuned and did some regulation on a Bosendorfer Imperial. What an awesome instrument! All nine and one-half feet and ninety seven keys...I was moved by the sight and sound of it, and I was humbled in its presence. I was inspired to stretch the limits of my abilities and honored to be trusted to make the needed changes in how it should feel and sound. What a contrast from the Winter spinet and (Chinese) Hamilton of the week before!

The main steps I took in regulating involved raising the hammer line, adjusting let-off and drop. However, the most dramatic change in touch was the result of easing the keys. They were extremely tight on the balance rail pins, and every one required the use of the wedge-shaped tool designed for that purpose. Polishing and lubricating all the key pins as well as the capstans, knuckles, and other friction points in the action also contributed to the satisfying result.

The tuning involved raising the pitch about ten cents. As each interval or unison came into alignment, the quality of the sound was amazing. It was rich and full; round and pleasing to my ears. The sustain was impressive. I don't play well, but I enjoyed trying what I knew, and it sounded way better than ever before.

To top off the experience, the owner of this magnificent instrument sat down and played it for me when I was finished. What a treat! He really lit it up and showed his appreciation for all my work. He shared stories from his past as the keyboard player of a well-known rhythm and blues/rock band out of Detroit most famous for their hits in the 1970's.

These opportunities come along only once in a while, so try to be ready and enjoy them fully! And come share at our next meeting your joys and/or woes from this great occupation we have in common.
