

Executive Outlook December 2014 Giving and Recceiving Norman Cantrell, RPT PTG President



"It's the most wonderful time of the year," sings Andy Williams in a song we all know. It certainly is one of the busiest times of the year, and it is a time that most are asked to give a little to help out here and there. Each one of us will come to a personal decision about the amount and type of giving in which we will engage. There is always some personal satisfaction in giving, especially when we give without expectation of getting anything in return.
